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Reimagining Faith and Public Life: Sex, Gender, and the Future of the Church

September 22, 2021

A student called one of the participants "one of the most inspiring people in the world to me" and "on a list of people, dead or alive, I'd most want to chat with." That speaker -Kristin Kobes Du Mez, the New York Times bestselling author of Jesus and John Wayne — took to the stage with Matthew Lee Anderson, the founder and lead writer of Mere Orthodoxy, to talk about gender roles and the church. More than ten organizations gave over \$7,000 to make this discussion and related events happen at JBU. 113 people attended the event in person and, since published, the recording has received 2,083 views. Additionally, 70 people participated in breakout events, such as meals and coffee hours with our quest speakers.

Each semester, our center offers a number of lectures for JBU's entire campus body and community members. We also provide a livestream to reach a broader audience.

#### **Laura Fabrycky Chapel Lecture**

February 1, 2021

Laura Fabrycky, author of *Keys to Bonhoeffer*, talked about Dietrich Bonhoeffer, 2 Kings, and Romans during her chapel lecture on JBU's campus. 809 people attended chapel with Laura.

#### Prayer, Politics, and the Psalms

February 1, 2021

Laura Fabrycky offered a theologically rich lecture on how sloth negatively affects our life together and how prayer and the psalms offer a way out. 32 people attended in person and 88 people have watched this lecture online. Laura also met with 48 people for breakout events such as meals and class visits.

#### **Brett Baggett Lecture**

March 1, 2022

Brett Baggett, a founder of the Abolitionist Abortion Movement, visited campus to talk about what this movement is and how this cause differs from the pro-life movement. The Q & A was lively; students and community members, most of whom disagreed with the guest speaker, engaged in a critical yet civil conversation with his views. 46 people attended in person. Brett Baggett also attended lunch with 10 students during his visit to JBU.

### **Diane Langberg Lecture: Ten Things** for Caregivers

March 10, 2022

In collaboration with the Center for Healthy Relationships, we helped bring Diane Langberg, a Christian psychologist who specializes in trauma response, to JBU's campus. The author of Redeeming Power: Understanding Authority and Abuse in the Church, her evening lecture offered a clear goal — to create communities that care for the vulnerable — and practical steps to attain that goal. Our center director, Jay Bruce, facilitated the Q & A. 224 people attended in person and 453 people have watched this lecture online.

#### **Working for the Common Good**

February 22, 2022

The Center for Faith and Flourishing partnered with the Soderquist College of Business to bring Walmart Senior Director of Corporate Sustainability, Marco Reyes, to campus, to talk about what it means to work for the common good in a corporate environment. 94 people attended the event in person, and 24 people attended a dinner with the guest speaker prior to the lecture.

### **Diane Langberg Workshop: Living with Traumatic Memories**

March 11, 2022

Diane Langberg talked with JBU's community about the burden of living with traumatic memories and offered tips on caring for oneself as a caregiver. 35 people attended the event in person, and 1,284 have watched this event online.

#### **Jacob Howland Dinner & Lecture**

November 4, 2021

In his lecture, Jacob Howland, McFarlin Professor of Philosophy Emeritus at the University of Tulsa, offered an account of the liberal arts and why we should pursue them. This event, targeted specifically at Gateway students, was made possible by the support of the Intercollegiate Studies Institute. A total of 34 people attended the lecture.

Gateway is a class for first-year students at JBU. In an effort to promote engagement with these students, our center placed several guest speakers in Gateway classrooms. We also hosted two events, including our first-ever lecture targeted specifically for Gateway students, to bolster this portion of our programming.

#### **Alan Noble Gateway Class Visits**

November 10, 2021

Alan Noble discussed the contents of his book, You Are Not Your Own, in Dan Bennett's Gateway class, and then spoke that same day to Tracy Balzer's Gateway class. A total of 39 people were in the two classes.

Liberty Tree also generously paid for a meal for staff and faculty responsible for organizing the colloquium. 5 people attended.



### FACULTY ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Faculty at the Center for Faith and Flourishing stay intellectually engaged.

Center director Jay Bruce published "Justice, and Only Justice: The Beauty of Impartiality and the Ugliness of Her Rivals" in Religion & Liberty 34:3–4, and he delivered the lecture "Why Justice?" for the Wilberforce International Institute. 14 people were in attendance. This spring, Jay served as the discussion leader for a graduate colloquium on "The Sacred Rights of Conscience: The Development of Religious Liberty in America, 1610–1835" for the Acton Institute and Liberty Fund. 20 people attended the colloquium.

Assistant director Dan Bennett published two articles on religious liberty: "Don't Let Religious Liberty Claims Mask Bad Faith Arguments" and "Care About Religious Liberty? Defend Religious Minorities." Additionally, Dan was a panelist and attendee at a symposium on "Academic Research Symposium on Religious Liberty in Diverse Communities" in Washington, D.C., hosted by the Institute for Humane Studies.

### M O R EC I T I N G

#### **Community Impact**

The Center for Faith and Flourishing partnered with 16 separate institutions to organize and fund events this year. Our center welcomed individuals from six different universities to participate in colloquia, and we invited leaders from local churches and community leaders from around Northwest Arkansas to campus for lectures, discussions, and dinners. We continue to livestream our events, and the content we post online has viewers from around the world. We're excited about the growing impact our center has in Northwest Arkansas and beyond!

#### **Center Spotlight**

The Mercatus Center at George Mason University highlighted the work of the Center for Faith and Flourishing this December. Mercatus emphasized our Philosophy, Politics, and Economics programming and the reach of our events both in person and online.

#### **Video Archives**

We've continued to edit and publish videos as part of our Philosophy, Politics, and Economics (PPE) video series. These videos capture some of the most thoughtful comments our quest speakers offered students last year. In addition to publishing PPE content, our livestreamed events from last year are also available on our YouTube page. Since last year's annual report, we've had 1,165 views of previous PPE programming and events. This number does not include the many who engage with our content via republication in other media!

### R O O M F O RG R O W T H

It's important to consider how elements of our programming should be adjusted for next year and to think about what our programming will look like in the future. Although we expanded our Gateway programming this year, there is still room for growth. We can build on what we've done this year by placing more speakers in Gateway classrooms, and we would should host more events for this group of students, most of whom are new to college and all of whom are new to JBU.

We also want to equip students with practical skills that will prepare them for the job market or for graduate studies. Hosting a hands-on seminar to sharpen professional skills might be in order this upcoming year, and this event could have a broad appeal to many students on campus.
